## I. Reading comprehension

1. Cara Brookin, a mother who fled domestic violence with her four children, tells the incredible story of how she rebuilt her family by building her own home. When she escaped her violent husband in 2008, she and her kids felt broken. "We had been beaten so far down," said Cara. Nevertheless, she knew that she had to give her kids a new start if they ever had a chance of leaving the trauma behind them. And as she couldn't afford to buy a new home, they would have to roll up their sleeves and build it themselves. With no building experience, Cara and her kids sat and watched hours of YouTube tutorials to teach them how to construct everything. There was a lot of asking people for help, too.

2. The family began construction of their house in Hickory Drive, Arkansas, in 2008. There were months of backbreaking labor. Then, the stunning five-bedroom home was complete. A year later, Cara and her children moved in. The property was purchased and built for \$130,000. The last time it was appraised, it was valued at half a million dollars. "The idea of building our own home rose as the only possible way to rebuild my shattered family while we worked through the shock of domestic violence," Cara said. "We were not only building our home, we were rebuilding our family unit, our self-confidence."

3. Cara said that living in a home she and her loved ones built made it special. "There is nothing like living in a place where you have touched every single brick!" she declared. "What's important is that we are who we are today thanks to it." The memories of building together will stay with the family years on end. However, that doesn't mean the Brookins will stay at that house forever. Cara also hopes that her story could inspire other victims of domestic abuse to do something "big" and life changing to reclaim their identity and their confidence.
